HEADMASTER'S REPORT

The 22nd October this year was a most memorable day in the life of the school. On that day the new dormitory house for girls was officially opened. All students and staff were involved in the preparations. Cleaning up the surroundings, positioning furniture, vacuuming and polishing, arranging seating and attending to visitors were some of the tasks and duties willingly undertaken.

Excessive rain had hindered progress and left little time for a number of final jobs, but everyone made an extra effort and with the help of a fine day prior to the event and on the day itself, all was looking well by Saturday afternoon. Some two hundred chairs were arranged in a natural open-air theatre setting around the end of the bridge which leads to the front door of the building. The architect had fixed a plaque to the entrance only that morning. It reads:

At 2.30 p.m. the official party arrived headed by the Archbishop John Grindrod K.B.E., Primate of Australia. Archbishop Grindrod is the President of the school. He was accompanied by Archdeacon Herbert Booth, the Chairman of the School Council. With the Headmaster was the invited chief guest, Miss Monica Miland of the Schools Commission. She represented Senator Susan Ryan, Minister of Education, who was overseas and therefore unable to attend. Tom McVeigh, the local Federal Member of Parliament; Mrs. Marie Booth, wife of the local State Member of Parliament; Barry Masters, the Mayor; and Norman Reid, the Diocesan Registrar and Secretary of the School Council completed the party.

The Archbishop blessed and dedicated the building.

Sam Benn, the School Captain, read the story of the boy Jesus in the temple from St. Luke's Gospel.

Miss Monica Miland symbolically opened it by cutting a broad ribbon in the school colours of blue and gold.

Everyone then walked through and inspected the building.

Afternoon tea was served by our girl students to everyone on the lawns and all were entertained by Grades 8 and 9 playing wind instruments and Cassio electric organs. An Art Display by our Art Students on the veranda of Slade House was an added attraction.

Perhaps the most noticeable feature of the occasion was the bearing, manner and dress of your children who confidently and politely entertained and hosted their many guests.

Our visitor from farthest away was Mrs. Woods, mother of Glen. She had travelled from Darwin to witness the opening. She said that she was taking back with her a strong commendation of the school and a resolve to send her other children here when they are old enough. I thank her and the other parents who made long journeys for their attendance.

Now we must concentrate on the school for next year. The new building gives us a few more places and so there is the opportunity for more applicants.

To the parents, thank you for your co-operation throughout the year. I hope you will all consider yourselves as part of the school in the coming year and that you will co-operate in our efforts.

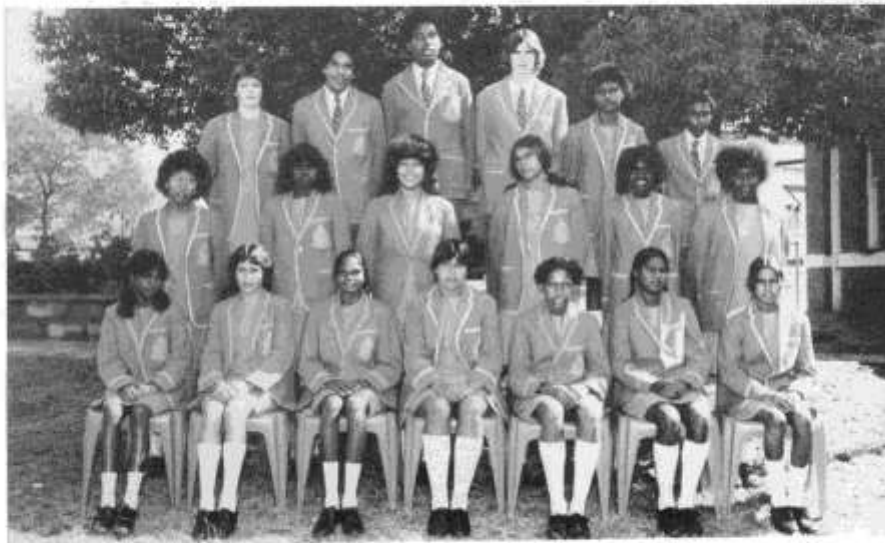

EXCURSIONS

Excursions provide us with the opportunity of observing a wider range of materials that have been discussed in the classroom.

Undoubtedly the highlight for Years 10, 11 and 12 Agriculture Students was the visit to Vocol Artificial Insemination Centre. This centre is run by the D.P.I. and deals mainly with dairy cattle, although some outstanding beef bulls are kept.

The D.P.I. put a great deal of effort into our tour. We were shown the whole process, from the semen collection right through to the liquid nitrogen containers for the straw transport. We also toured the bull pens, seeing breeds not seen by us before.

On the same day, Farmfest '83 was visited. This provided us with the opportunity to see the latest farming equipment and some of the inventions that are produced by farmers.

Another Agricultural excursion was a visit to the 1983 Warwick Show. This allowed us to familiarise ourselves with different cattle breeds and wool types.

The Year 10 Design for Living class visited the Endeavour Centre on their Open Day, and couldn't help but be impressed by the activities provided.

Most were fascinated with the paper "logs" which are used in fires.

The Years 10, 11 and 12 spent one day in Brisbane visiting sites of possible future careers. One group went with Mr. Ian Robinson of the C.E.S. and visited the Careers Library, Annerley State School, and Mt. Gravatt College of Advanced Education. The rest visited the State Government's Careers Day at the Chandler Complex then Queensland University where they toured the campus and the Archaeological museum.

Warwick's Careers Day, organised by Rotary, was also visited by the Years 11 and 12. All students talked with people actually working in their careers, so a great deal of practical knowledge was gained.

The Year 10 students visited the Darling Downs Institute of Technology to experience the different careers possible from the Engineering faculty. All thoroughly enjoyed the day and learnt a great deal.

No tale of excursions can be complete without a thank you to those who conducted them. All the excursions were relevant to the students and therefore interesting.

DIVING

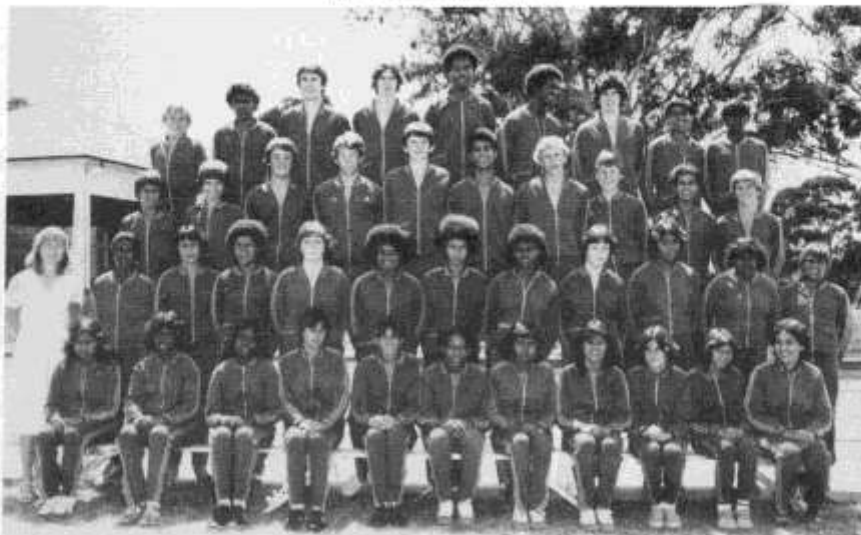
