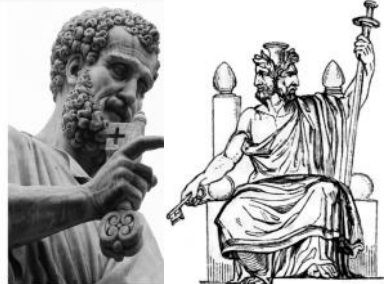

Doors, gateways and transitions



I F YOU'VE EVER WONDERED HOW JANUARY GAINED ITS NAME, you have Janus to thank! As the Roman god of beginnings and transitions, Janus is the namesake of January—first month of each new year carrying right through from ancient Roman times to modern day calendars. In classical mythology, Janus was the god of doors, gates, and transitions and, as such, represented the middle ground between both concrete and abstract dualities such as life/death, beginning/end, youth/adulthood, rural/urban, war/peace, and barbarism/civilization. What is unusual about the god Janus is his iconic image. As the god of transitions and dualities, Janus is always portrayed with two faces—one facing the past, and one facing the future. He also holds a key in his right hand, which symbolizes his protection of doors, gates, thresholds, and other separations or openings between spatial boundaries...

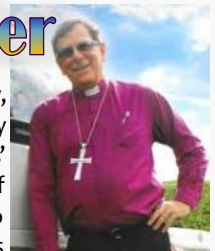
As the first quarter of 2022 concludes, we look back upon the recent past with the many challenges it has brought to our own doors. These include, but are by no means limited to, the ongoing global pandemic with so much associated confusion, misinformation, feelings of powerlessness, vaccines not developed at the outset, then limited availability once accessible, economic hardship, high mortality rates among vulnerable groups, forced separation from loved ones, devastating bushfires, floods and shortages of goods and services. All have wreaked havoc on what we previously failed to appreciate was a comparatively ruffle-free existence before these and other disasters came to pass. Now, with brutal war currently raging in Ukraine, those of us who have already lived through, and served in armed conflicts, are looking on with concern and no little anxiety for what the future holds. In ancient Rome, the symbol of the key also signified that a traveller has come to find safe harbour or to trade goods in peace. We can but hope and pray that the current situation will shortly and satisfactorily be resolved with as few casualties as possible and a cessation of murderous attacks from the invaders that we have seen.

My memory goes back to the annual celebration of these events at Slade, The Martyrs' Memorial School, Popondetta (Papua), St Francis' College, the parishes of Ipswich, Childers, Centenary Suburbs, Charleville, Algester, Chelmer, Kangaroo Point, as the Regional Bishop for the Western Region and for the last eight years as Priest-in-Charge at Moggill-Mt Crosby. In all of these places Easter has always been a special and joyful time for me.



However, this year I do not feel very much joy. The situation in Ukraine is beyond belief. Watching the nightly news revealing terrible acts of cruelty. The bombing of hospitals, schools, apartment buildings, churches and other places where people have the right to feel safe. But not so. Indiscriminate bombings with no regard for human life, with injury and death inflicted on the youngest to the oldest. How this terrible event will end is not yet clear but I do know that there are millions of victims at the mercy of a very cruel and ruthless man.

This Eastertide I would like to suggest that wherever you are celebrating, be it with family and/or friends, you will spare some quiet time to reflect on the people of Ukraine and Russia as they are caught up in this horrible and senseless war, but also find time to examine and then reflect on your own personal relationships and, if need be, resolve to make amends where necessary.

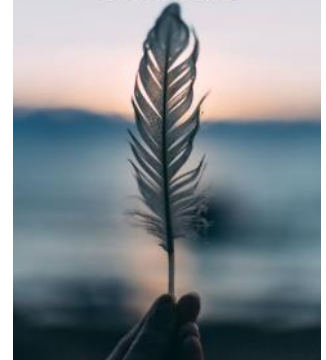
As always, it is good to hear back from our readers concerning items they found of interest. It all helps nurture the connections that we all share and which are generated by Kinawah.

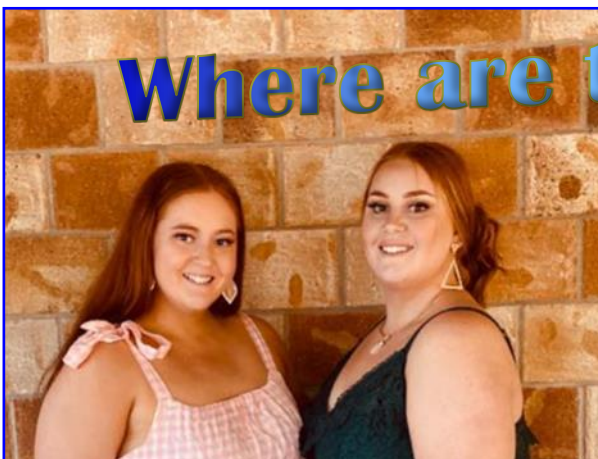
As we wind down the Term and get ready for holidays, I pray that you and your family have a restful and refreshing break.

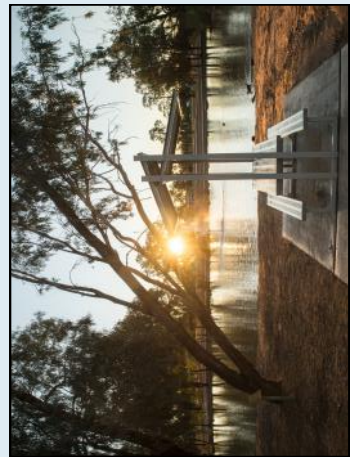

OAM for one of our own

Several of our past students have made significant contributions to the communities in which they live and work after leaving our schools and this year **Margaret Thorsborne** was recognised in the New Year's honours list for her continuing work in the pioneering field of restorative justice. Margaret, who boarded at St Catharine's 1963-1966 came to us from Goondiwindi and was Slade House Captain in 1965 and School Captain in 1966. She has kept up close friendships with school friends including Roslyn Stehr and Lynn Stower to this day and cites these friendships as one of the enduring positives of her years at school.

Margaret, enrolled in a Science degree at QLD University choosing between this and Music at the QLD Conservatorium. She majored in Physiology with a secondary major in Zoology and went on to also graduate with a Diploma in Education to become a teacher. She also completed a post graduate course in the guidance area as a school counsellor. After 28 years she is now regarded as an international expert in the area in which she specialises and for which she was awarded an OAM.

In her own words, here is what her work entails.

"Schools are slowly realising that the traditional ways of dealing with discipline issues don't effect the kind of behaviour change we hope for. While a punitive approach may well deter a behaviour, it is hopelessly inadequate to develop the skills that kids have not yet acquired that caused the problems in the first place! This means a different approach to accountability - and that is mainly that we hold each other accountable for the harms that are done when the rules are broken, or when our expectations are not met. This "relational" approach involves those responsible and those harmed having a voice in the problem-solving and it allows those in the problem a chance to make sense of how come something has happened (the why), the impact on others (the harm) and how to move forward, by healing those harms and making things right.

"Schools better understand these days that they are in the business of behaviour *development* rather than the command-and-control approach of behaviour *management*. Both schools and families are involved in the *it takes a village to raise a child*, and if we think carefully about the kind of skills we hope kids can acquire - empathy, understanding that their behaviour impacts on others, perspective taking, being honest and being conflict competent - then we really do need to do things differently with our discipline systems in schools.

"It's the focus on harm to *relationships* that gives everyone healthier options to solve their conflicts. It is hard work and often deeply challenging



and emotional, but worth the energy and commitment to change perspectives, mindsets and then practices. For any school this is a huge commitment to the *way we do business here*.

"I also do this kind of work, as a consultant, for workplace conflict, in response to formal complaints and grievances, or teams that may have become dysfunctional. It's been a long hard slog for me. I needed to know *more about culture change* in organisations, not just how to improve my own practice! That's been a game changer.

"I've worked in schools and other sectors like police and corrections across Australia, NZ, SE Asia, Canada and UK - my company also has a office in London.

"Retirement is a long way off!!"

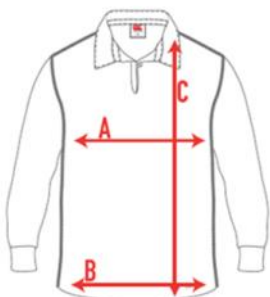

As evidenced by the photo on page 7 which was sent in by John Blackwood, boxing was one of the sporting options offered at Slade in the 1950s. A brief internet search did not find any information or reference to the Bill Adams mentioned below although the 1957 school magazine cites him as "an Olympic fighter". Is there anyone among our old boys who might be able to tell us more?

Almost every Tuesday evening during term the old "gym" becomes a hive of activity as the boxers from the Primary and Secondary Divisions, under the tuition and supervision of Mr Bill Adams, strive hard for the condition, speed and skill so necessary for success in this strenuous sport.

During the year we have taken part in boxing contests conducted at Killarney, Tannymorel, and St Mary's Hall and the Railway Institute Hall in Warwick. The Blue and Gold blazer has become a familiar sight at all boxing contests in the district, and Slade had a big following among the fight fans. Our boxers have always acquitted themselves very creditably, both in and out of the ring, and it is always a great pleasure to be associated with them at these public appearances.

The boxers range in size from the paper-weights at Highfields to the light-heavyweights in the Secondary School, and we have very fine performances in every division.

Keith Wright, Ron Watson, Owen Bell, John Warren, Eric Pryor, the Morrison brothers (Milton, Rex, Shane and Rhett), Ivan Martin, Neville Barwick are all quite efficient boxers of whom any school could justifiably be proud, and most of them have won trophies (some of them have won several trophies). Keith Wright, Ron Watson, Owen Bell, Eric Pryor, Rex Morrison, Rhett Morrison, and Neville Barwick are all holders of School titles.

Our sincere thanks are due to Mr Bill Adams for the keen interest he shows in his charges both at training in the gym and while in their corners at the boxing tournament.

Besides the boys mentioned above, there are many others in the squad, ranging from beginners to whom the "noble art" is as yet unknown to those who have come quite some way but still have quite a lot to learn.

reflections on loss and gratitude

Plunged yet again into the Pool that is 'Lockdown' in our Lives, 'Abnormal' becoming 'Normal', Day-to-Day Existence as we know it is seemingly 'Down the Gurgler'. So distressing and boring as we resent our Lives being violated by Restrictive Circumstances beyond our Control. We either rebel or accept, so in Acceptance Mode, I have decided to reflect upon various Influences on my Life in Lockdown, Memories, 'Angels, Goddesses and the Odd God', my Reflections on Life before the Virus.

Angels, most important, loved and beautiful, in Life and in Dreams. I first needed them when I lost my Hearing, in 2001, dramatically, a Week after having my 1st 'Flu Injection. We take for granted all our Faculties, never dreaming that we may, one Day have to cope without one of our Senses. Silence is strange, terrifying at first, cutting one off Socially from Others which was my greatest Fear. My Husband and Friends were wonderful, communicating with me by means of Notes, but I became a proficient Lip-Reader, which is still helpful Today. My Angel and God Mark 1 was my ENT Specialist, Dr Bruce Black who recommended that I have a Cochlear Implant, a 'Gift' which I thought was reserved for Deaf Children. A Miracle occurred, his Wife, Jane, a Social Worker headed up my 'Team', working as a Support System with Karen, my Audiologist, Angels Mark 2 and 3. The Holy Spirit Hospital in Brisbane was wonderful, my Male Nurse, God Mark 4, a Reincarnation of Ioan Gruffud, so I really did feel I was in 7th Heaven, Post-Operative Pethidine, Toasted Sandwiches, Coffee with an Angel.

They all remain Special to this Day, having given me the Gift of Hearing.

Silence, I did appreciate, taking one into a Secret World, so my 2 Years of Peace and Tranquility, I did appreciate. The

'Sounds of Silence' are Magic.

An amusing Anecdote from my 2 Years of Deafness—an Incident which could only happen at the Gold Coast! We spent a Week-End at Broadbeach, enjoying Lunch both Days at an Italian Restaurant 'Soprano's'. David was writing me Notes in a small Spirax Notebook, an efficient Method of Communication, God Dionysus blending well with Italian Cuisine. As we were about to depart, the Owner came over with a Query: ' We noticed that you were writing in a Notebook during your Lunches, both Speaking as the other wrote Notes. We thought you must be Restaurant Critics!' No, unfortunately, so Hilarity all round, a Story for the Archives of my Life. 'There's no such Thing as a free Lunch', but a Bubbles and Pate Day.

My Goddesses! Aphrodite Goddess of Beauty and Love, my Hairdresser who cared about my Hair and Scalp Post-operatively, as I had to wait 3 Weeks for a Shampoo to remove Blood from my Scalp! Kitchen Goddesses a la Nigella Lawson, my Friends who brought me Cakes, Gifts and Goodies when I was on Antibiotics, looking and feeling dreadful in a Rainy and Humid March in Queensland Finally Dionysus, God of Wine, bringing forth the Fruits of the Vine in Celebration after a long Journey with Angels who supported me through my Cochlear Implant Operation, a God-Sent Group, I was so fortunate to have Team A1!

My last Goddess is Diana the Huntress and Protector of Animals, wearing several Guises. Aukubras, Hats in Undercover Disguise, usually RM Williams 'Driza-Bone', patrolling the Boundary Fences at St George. She is known to many as a Spirit of the District, I call her ' Muse' and Friend.

I first met Peter when he attended our Special General Meeting in May 2016. He may have lost the use of his voice when cancer saw him placed in palliative care in May last year but his mind remained sharp and we enjoyed a lively back and forth of emails exchanging jokes and reminiscences. We both knew he was living on borrowed time but he was an excellent proof reader of Kinawah for me and I miss his input and the friendship we forged. A search through back issues turned up this note from him which gives us a hint of his boyhood. Our records show that he worked as a draftsman for the Main Roads Department from 1951.

May 16, 2020 Just writing to thank you for your time and effort for these wonderful editions over the past two months. They have given us some very interesting reading during these strange times. Nina and I were on a cruise on Queen Elizabeth when the times were changing back in early March. Captain Inger Thorhauge, the first lady captain we've sailed with, made sure the ship was clean and spotless at all times so there were no sickness problems throughout the cruise. We were in port in Burnie, Tasmania, at the time of the toilet roll fiasco, the locals thought it a great joke as the wharves were covered in wood chip ready to be shipped to the mainland for the manufacture of toilet rolls. We had three ports of call in PNG and in the short time we had with the people there I understand your great regards for those from PNG who attended St. Cath's. Among your interesting articles was 'Rowing at Slade 1930s' bringing back memories of how I came to go to Slade. Mum and Dad gave me the chance to choose between Slade and Ipswich Grammar. Slade won because of the rowing and that photo which was in the School Prospectus in late 1944. We had a rowing boat used for fishing in Kent's Lagoon a few miles from Kalbar. I'd helped in building the boat (most likely by being in the way) and I enjoyed the many days we went fishing. In the previous edition in Chapter 2 of your book you mentioned those strange loaves of bread. My Dad was the baker in Kalbar so I know all about High Tops and Marrieds. They were very popular with the farmers for cut lunches. Also during and after WW2 there was no delivery so the bread was sent to the farm families in their cream cans on return from the butter factory. The marrieds were easier to pack into the cans especially when the orders were for eight or more loaves. I can remember two or three orders were for twelve loaves three times a week. Just in case you're worried, the cans had all been steam cleaned at the butter factory.

It's funny how these things come to mind with a little nudge. They were not forgotten just stored away safely.
